HISTORY OF ARGENTINA, 1810-present

The course studies the history of the Argentine Republic from Independence to the beginning of the 21st-Century. In the course of the semester we will study the conflicts that plagued Argentina in its long transition from colony to nation, the rapid and unprecedented process of modernization that, at the beginning of the 20th-Century, placed this nation among the wealthiest in the world, the emergence of Juan Perón and Evita as the leaders of Latin America's most influential populist movement, the violent cycle of military interventions that dominated most of the last century, etc.

The classes will engage both the instructor and the students in thorough explorations of the assigned texts and discussions of the historical topics under study. Thus, keeping up with the readings and coming to class well prepared is a must.

Grades will be determined as follows: class attendance (5%), quizzes (45%), 1st exam (25%), and 2nd exam (25%).

October 3. I will give more details about this activity in class.

I will also show Argentine and US movies that deal with the history of Argentina, such as María Luisa Bemberg's *Camila*, Luis Puenzo's *The Official Story*, and Alan Parker's (and Madonna's) *Evita*.
