Course Description

“Queer” is a slur, a form of activism, and an area of academic inquiry; an umbrella term for the QUILTBAG population and an identity category in its own right; a noun, an adjective, and a verb. This course explores the interplay between these forms of “queer” in popular culture—popular culture that is *about* queers, that *is* queer, and the process of *queering* it. It is organized around, but also troubles, the traditional division of media studies into production, text, and audience, looking at how queers produce media, how queer media is produced, and how media production is queer; how texts are about queers or *are* queer or queering/disorienting; queer folks as audiences, audiences for queer texts, or audiences as queering ostensibly “straight” texts; as well as how with digital media things get quite queer with drawing sharp categorical distinctions between these three sites at all.

Course Objectives

By the end of this course, students will:

- Have a foundational understanding of queer studies
- Gain familiarity with production, text, and audience approaches to popular cultural study
- Understand and be able to conduct queer analysis of popular culture
- Acquire familiarity with the fundamentals of academic publishing

Assignments and Grading

Weekly Questions (15%, 15 points x 10): In 10 of 15 weeks of their choice, students will send me 3 discussion questions by email, due 2 hours before class time.

Journal Review (25%, 250 points): Students will review the most recent 3 years of a journal of their choice for how queer popular culture/queer analysis of popular culture features in the scholarship it publishes.

Paper Proposal (10%, 100 points): A 2-3 page proposal of a research question and a plan for how the student intends to answer it.

Paper Draft (10%, 100 points): Students will produce a full draft of their paper for peer review.

Peer Review (10%, 2 x 50 points): Students will perform double-blind peer review on two other students' papers.

Final Paper (30%, 300 points): Based on the feedback from the reviews, students will revise their final paper and submit it.

Required Reading

The reading for this course is relatively light (~100 pgs/week) and focused (specific chapters rather than entire books).
