

## Shaping and Reshaping Shanghai's Religious Space

Shanghai is a metropolis that prides itself on its cultural and religious diversity. An ever-growing number of religious traditions strive to carve a space for themselves within the spiritual landscape of the city. At the same time, they all concur to build and transform the ethos of Shanghai as they remold spaces for their own use, foster ritual practices, and start social and cultural initiatives. This presentation, largely based on ongoing, collaborative fieldwork conducted during the last three years with researchers and students from Fudan University and Shanghai Academy of Social Sciences, focuses on the way sacredness continues to be engineered in today's Shanghai.



Benoît Vermander holds a MA in political science from Yale University, a doctorate in political science from Sciences Po Paris, and a doctorate in theology from the Jesuit Faculties of Paris. He served as the director of the Taipei Ricci Institute from 1996 to 2009 where he directed the publication of the Ricci Chinese-French Dictionary and other research projects. He is currently a professor of religious science, academic director of the Xu-Ricci Dialogue Research Center and the co-director for the Center for French Studies at Fudan University in Shanghai.
