Does Religious Diversity Affect Religious Commitment? Some New Answers to an Old Question

Does religious diversity diminish religious participation as many secularization theories argue or does it boost religious participation as religious economies models argue? Testing this crucial hypothesis has been fraught with methodological challenges and empirical complications. We adapt a method first suggested by Voas et al. (2002) to examine the effects of religious diversity on individual commitment. The paper distributed prior to the class session first uses the combined World Values and European Values Surveys (WVS-EVS) and finds that religious diversity has a strong, robust, and negative relationship with individual religiosity. Using the cumulative U.S. General Social survey the relationship is
