## CLCS 23500: Introduction to Classical Mythology

A study of the myths of western antiquity, as represented in Greek and Latin texts and images dating from roughly the 8<sup>th</sup> through the 1<sup>st</sup> centuries BCE. Along with learning specific mythic narratives and examining their place in ancient society, we will also be concerned with how deeply our own modern habits of thinking — about such things as nature, self, society, power, sexuality, gender, work, death — are influenced by Greco-Roman myths.
