## DISSERTATION

"The Origins and Development of *Jueju* Verse" Committee chair, Professor David R. Knechtges.

The jueju (or quatrain) was one of the most important and popular genres in the Chinese poetic tradition. The object of this dissertation is to trace the development of the jueju from its earliest stages (beginning with the Han dynasty) up to the Tang. It is only by identifying the early history of this genre and the many elements and forces that shaped it, that we can begin to understand why such a brief and apparently simple form could be the vehicle for such a rich tradition of poetry.
